


Reading for Pleasure Newsletter Autumn 2 2023

Books to try...



Tuuli is a prehistoric girl, travelling with her tribe through the seasons – making camp, hunting for food and protecting themselves against the many hazards that the climate throws at them. Tuuli knows there's a bigger world out there, and when she spots a strange boy lurking outside their camp, she realises that he might hold the adventure she is looking for.

He is from another tribe, sent to find safer ground and as he and Tuuli strike up an unlikely friendship, they set out on a journey that will impact the rest of human history.

A vast adventure with a very human heart, full of wild animals, huge scenery and heartstopping danger and inspired by real anthropological discoveries. The stunning debut novel from *Digging for Britain* presenter, Professor Alice Roberts, for fans of His Dark Materials, *Wolf Brother* and *The Last Bear*.



When Tasha's family moves to take care of her ageing Grandpa, lonely and traumatised by a past event, Tasha finds making friends difficult. When the mesmerising first snow of the year arrives, she is enthralled and delights in making a beautifully intricate snow girl, Alyana. Grandpa says that the first snow is powerful and wishes made on it always come true, if that's true then maybe Tasha can finally have a friend of her own. As Tasha enjoys magical winter nights with her new friend, Grandpa's health continues to fade, only spring can help him. But what will warmer days mean for Alyana?

Set against a beautiful snowy landscape, this tale of family, friendship, trust and accepting help will delight readers of all ages. The cast of characters leap from the page, and once again we enjoy Anderson's celebration of loving and important intergenerational relationships. Likewise, strands of Slavic folklore are skilfully woven throughout the story, creating an enchanting story of magic and adventure. Year 7 11+



Steeped in atmosphere and myth, Danny Weston's *Postcards from Valhalla* is a fabulously realised adventure for 11+year-olds. Chillingly suspenseful as the lines between reality and fantasy are blurred, it's a completely compelling story, driven by a quest to find a missing brother, and underpinned by a sense of family.

15-year-old Viggo is getting on with his life in Edinburgh when his mum brings bad news — his older brother Magnus has gone missing in Shetland, where he was working on a Viking settlement. Viggo's response is understated - to begin with, at least. In Viggo's view, Magnus was a "total weirdo", and he'd "lost count of all the disasters that Magnus had caused." But this time, they have more reason to worry — the boys' father went missing in the same spot a few years ago (missing, presumed dead), so Viggo and his mum journey to Shetland.

Soon enough, Viggo is plagued by spiralling visions of Viking ships and weird creatures. The sense of fear and escalating danger is viscerally evoked, and so too are emotions around love and loss.

The series concept, described as the 'exploded encyclopaedia' with "everything you need to know about science, one book at a time!" It takes key scientific subjects and presents them in a way that is both entertaining and readable with an attractive pocket-sized format and witty illustrations demonstrating that the series is designed for reading for pleasure.

It's Arjan's sixteenth birthday and he's celebrating with his mates – going to see a film and then get a Nando's. He's looking forward to some good banter and wondering what might happen with Jem, who's been looking at him differently these days ...

But the night comes to a dramatic and violent end when Arjan is targeted by a group of racist thugs, who single him out due to the colour of his skin and the turban that he wears as a symbol of his commitment to his faith and culture.

Is the life of a good friend and beloved son really worth so little?

Neurodivergence-Focused Text 11+



Ten-year-old Frank loves code and numbers; they're a way to make sense of the world, as well as providing secret languages to share with his friends and his mum. Frank's five-year-old brother Max is autistic and for him the world is often a scary place, when anything unexpected, too loud or too bright can cause him to have a meltdown. The story is narrated by Frank and every reader will understand his frustration at the unfairness of life. We know that he loves Max, but we know too how hard Max makes life for all the family. Frank is then faced with something even more terrible when tragedy strikes. With the help of those around him we watch Frank find a way to make sense of what has happened and the bravery to cope with the different world. Katya Balen has worked with neuro-divergent children and there's a powerful sense of truth and understanding in her beautifully told story.
